For example, the language Costs an arm and a leg means that something is very expensive. The literal meaning (that something has to be paid for with body parts) is not usually considered. English learners may have difficulty understanding idioms, as their figurative meaning is often unclear. Languages are widely used in literature. They can make writing more colorful and interesting. Take, for example, this passage from Thomas Mann's novel *Tristan*: If you flatter yourself that you've put some fancy idea on my wife's head, then you're barking at the wrong tree, my friend! My wife has too much common sense! Here the language that barks the wrong tree is a living way of saying wrong, and adds energy to the dialogue. Shakespeare William Shakespeare is credited with creating many common English expressions. In the play *Macbeth*, he wrote: If murder / Could spring up the consequence, and grab / With his surcease, success: that but this time / It could be the be-all and end-all here. Today, being-everything and the end of it all is widely used to signify the central and important part. In *The Taming of the Shrew*, Shakespeare uses the language now known to kill with kindness. He wrote: This is a way to kill a woman with kindness, / And therefore I will slow down her crazy and strong humor. Killing kindly means exaggerating one's efforts to be kind. Why use idioms? While idioms are more common in spoken language, they are often shown in books and writing. In F. Scott Fitzgerald's novel *The Great Gatsby*, Gatsby says Daisy's voice is full of money. Doesn't mean he has money in his mouth. Instead, it means it's obvious to anyone who hears her talk that she's rich. The use of this language adds a playful element to the conversation. It's much more interesting and uncommon to hear that someone's voice is made of money than feeling someone is rich. By using a speech figure, the dialogue in the book can also sound more like everyday conversation. Another use for idioms is to sum up a complicated situation in a nutshell. Many idioms, like atop a stream without a shovel, can involve the consequences of a situation without explaining unimportant details. Climbing a stream without a paddle means someone is in deep trouble and that it will be difficult for them to solve their problem. Logging into learning some English languages is highly recommended, as this really helps to give the impression of fluency and superior language skills. Note that due to the nature of the algorithm, some results returned by your query may only be concepts, ideas, or words that are related to the term (perhaps tenuously). This is simply because of the way the search algorithm works. You might also have noticed that many of the synonyms or slang-related words are racist/sexist/offensive/downright terrible – this is mainly thanks to the lovely community in the Urban (not affiliated with urban thesaurus). Urban Thesaurus trawles the web and collects millions of different slang terms, many of which come from the UD and come out to be truly terrible and insensitive (this is the nature of urban jargon, I suppose). Hopefully the words and related synonyms for the term are a little tamer than average. Urban Urban Thesaurus was created indexing millions of different slang terms that are defined on sites like Urban Dictionary. These indices are used to find correlations of use between slang terms. The official Urban Dictionary API is used to display scroll definitions. Note that this thesaurus is by no means affiliated with the Urban Dictionary. Because of the way the algorithm works, the thesaurus gives you mainly related slang words, rather than exact synonyms. The higher the terms on the list, the more likely there are to word or phrase you searched for. The search algorithm handles phrases and word strings pretty well, so for example, if you want words related to lol and rofl you can type in rofl lol and it should give you a stack of related slang terms. Or you can try to groom or girlfriend to get words that can mean any of these (e.g. bae). Also note that due to the nature of the Internet (and especially UD), there will often be many terrible and offensive terms in the results. There's still a lot of work to be done to get this slang thesaurus to give consistently good results, but I think it's on stage where it might be useful for people, that's why I released it.
